The dog days of **August are back!**

he summer has flown by, but we still have a few weeks of hot weather left before we feel the relief of autumn. Cooling your home is a large part of your monthly energy use and can yield significant savings by doing just a few things:

- 1. Air filter: Purchase a jumbo pack of new HVAC air filters and replace your old filters monthly. Remove anything that may be blocking the return air grille, including dust buildup. Having maximum air flow will make your home more comfortable and increase efficiency.
- Direct sunlight: We can recall the difference in returning to a car that was parked in the sun as opposed to the shade. The same is true when sun pours into your home through the windows. Shades, blinds and drapes are a great way to block radiant heat that is a result of direct sunlight and help your cooling system do its job. Landscaping can also be used on the south side of the home to block direct sunlight from entering your home.
- 3. Air infiltration: Gaps around exterior doors and old seals can allow heat to enter your home. Although the gaps may be small, the continual infiltration can made a big difference. Door sweeps and fresh seals can block air penetration and keep your home cooler.

Valuable rebates offered by co-op

If you are a Lower Yellowstone Rural Electric Cooperative (LYREC) member, we have several rebates available.

Electric water heaters:

- At least a 40-gallon tank.
- \$4-per-gallon rebate, not to exceed \$300.
- Insulation factor of R12-13, EER (at least) 0.9.
- At least a 10-year warranty.
 (Extended warranties do not qualify.)

Electric heat:

- Rebate amount of \$25 per kilowatt of installed load of electric heat.
- It can be electric baseboard, electric plenum heaters or heat pumps.
- Space heating is the only use for the heater.
- The member may put the heaters under the electric heat rate program. (Contact our office for more information about the electric heat rate program.)

Heat pump:

- Rebate amount of \$150 per ton of installed heat pump.
- The heat pump can be either air- toair or ground-source.

Service upgrade:

- LYREC agrees to rebate its member up to and not exceeding \$200 for upgrading a residential member's electric service.
- The cooperative retains the right to specify the brand, size and manufacturer of its choice.

Double-throw switch:

- LYREC agrees to rebate its member up to and not exceeding \$200 for installing a double throw-switch on a residential member's service.
- The cooperative retains the right to specify brand, size and manufacturer of its choice.

Grain drying:

- LYREC agrees to rebate its member \$30 per horsepower for an electric natural air grain drying setup on a grain bin.
- The cooperative retains the right to specify brand, size and manufacturer of its choice.

The member must provide proof of purchase for any of the above rebates. For more information on rebates, please call LYREC.
